Executive Director

The year 2004 was an exciting time for Scadding Court Community Centre (SCCC) as we continued to actualize our community's strategic vision for the organization.

Some highlights of the year:

- Scadding Court, in partnership with the Cooperative Housing Federation of Toronto raised and distributed \$28,000.00 in scholarship money for youth pursuing post-secondary education through our third successful Anti-Racism Scholarship Dinner.
- The Centre conducted educational workshops and information sessions to local area agencies and developed partnerships with service providers, advocacy groups and legal clinics to help people have better access to the police complaints system.
- Scadding Court, in partnership with REACH, a non-governmental organization (NGO) based in West Bengal, India, founded a school for children living with disabilities in Agartala, India.
- In partnership with the City of Toronto, Parks and Recreation Department, the Co-operative Housing Federation of Toronto, Mount Sinai Hospital, Hong Fook Mental Health Association and Clay and Paper Theatre we started to explore the possibilities of creating a new facility accessible to seniors and people living with disabilities. In doing so, community consultations allowed us to hear from our community residents, people living with disabilities, seniors and other stakeholders about what is needed and why.

In terms of staying true to our philosophy of being proactive and finding new ways of doing business, these highlights demonstrate how the Centre has remained focused on improving access to programs and services, creating innovative and relevant programming while continuing to support the priority issues identified by members of our community.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and staff team at SCCC, I would like to extend a big thank you to members of our community, partner agencies and Centre volunteers for continuing to make SCCC a leader in this community and in the City of Toronto. Without your vision, support, direction and guidance, the Centre would not be able to meet the needs in the neighbourhood and would not have the innovative programs and services that we are able to offer our clients.

Our Mission.... Making It Happen

In the year 2003, SCCC developed a new strategic plan with input from community members, partner agencies, staff and volunteers at the Centre. This process resulted in a change to our mission. Our mission now reflects our belief that who we are and what we do goes beyond our neighbourhood. Many of our programs and services benefit people from across the City and our international work, in particular with REACH, our partner agency in India, connects us with other communities at the global level.

2004 Program Highlights

Reach For More: An SCCC- REACH Partnership & School for Children Living with Disabilities in Agartala, India

Scadding Court Community Centre and REACH, an NGO based in West Bengal, India, embarked on an ambitious partnership in 2003 to establish a school for children living with disabilities in Agartala, India. SCCC is happy to announce that in 2004, we successfully raised enough funds to support this project.

As of February of 2004, the school is flourishing, delivering not only school-related activities, but multiple social supports to parents and families of children. Supports usually address key issues of health such as hygiene and disease control, as well as education and advocacy around disability issues. Education levels are limited and a huge barrier to promoting awareness; challenging the stigma associated with being differently-abled is greatly influenced by superstition and myth. REACH in India, and SCCC in Toronto are actively working to dispel much of this and develop resources and supports that will, over time, educate a wider audience in both cities. The Food for Thought Community Food Plan

The Food for Thought: Community Food Plan Report was released in January 2004 and details the findings of a nine month community consultation and needs assessment process that was funded by the City of Toronto Food and Hunger Action Fund. Along with documenting and characterizing high levels of local food insecurity, the plan provides a series of recommendations that are an important starting point from which to address the reality that many members of this community do not have regular access to enough safe, affordable and healthy food. Scadding Court Redevelopment Project

Since 1978 Scadding Court has offered high quality services to a community that is characterized by diversity. During this time, our focus has always been to ensure that ALL members of our community are able to access the programs and services that are important to them. In order for the Centre to be able to provide these services and to respond to the needs that the communities we serve have communicated to us, the decision was made to explore an expansion of our centre and the redevelopment of the site on which it sits.

During 2004, we explored the possibilities for redevelopment, consulted with our communities and stakeholders, developed partnerships and created a new model of service delivery that is based on partnerships and collaboration. Our partners in doing this were the City of Toronto Parks and Recreation Department, Mount Sinai Hospital, the Cooperative Housing Federation and the Hong Fook Mental Health Association - organizations with which SCCC has existing partnerships. Community consultation supported the idea of redevelopment, provided important information about what our communities want and need in a redeveloped SCCC and contributed to a solid foundation for the planning to come in 2005.

SCCC & CHFT: Investing in Our Diversity 2004

In 2004, Scadding Court Community Centre and the Co-operative Housing Federation of Toronto distributed \$28,000 in scholarship money to young people who demonstrated their commitment to combating racism in our society. Scholarship funds support post-secondary education, with awards that range from \$4,000 to \$1,000. 2004 sponsors included Precision Property Management, Prentice Yates and Clark; Chartered Accountants, Pamela Stephens Sales and Marketing and Metro Credit Union.

Community Education and Access to Police Complaints Demonstration Project (CEAPC)

In 2004, SCCC partnered with 33 organizations across the City of Toronto to develop a new model of service delivery - one that will help more residents of this City to understand and access the police complaints system.

The Toronto Police Service, advocacy groups, legal clinics and service providers are working together to ensure a culturally accessible service that will help people better understand and utilize the police complaints system.

Workshops and information sessions were held across the City and outreach materials were developed with the support of the City of Toronto and the Law Foundation of Ontario.

Support for Families

SCCC is happy to announce that two key programs were offered again in 2004: the Success by Six School Readiness Program sponsored by the United Way of Greater Toronto, and our very important Parenting 1234 program, sponsored by the City of Toronto and our local Early Years Centre.

The School Readiness Program is an exciting pre-school program that offers school readiness activities and information to newcomer families. Participants and teachers are very pleased with the results this program has delivered and we are very excited to have received three more years of funding to support the School Readiness Program until 2006!

The Parenting 1234 program works with teenage mothers in the community, assisting them with referrals, supports and parenting information on a weekly basis. Although SCCC cannot meet the demand for this program, we are happy that funding was made available to allow us to run it again this year. Participants have voiced how valuable this program is and what it means to them to be able to come to SCCC, meet other young parents and work together to develop strategies that will help them support their families.
