

## Message from the **Executive Director**

Every person who walks through our doors belongs to many different communities based on where they live, what stage of life they are in, what language they speak, etc... The programs, services and opportunities that we offer must take into account and reflect those different communities in order to truly understand and meet peoples' needs. Partnerships are one way through which to accomplish this. They also allow us to connect to what is going on in other areas, reach into and engage new communities, bring experience and expertise to our programs, to access new resources and make the most of those we have.

Much of what we do has been shaped by the local, citywide and even international partnerships within which we work. These partnerships exist in practice and not just on paper because, at the end of the day, partnerships must benefit our community and the people that live here in a tangible, meaningful way. Examples of how this happens are...

- Through a partnership with the Fort York Food bank, residents use our community garden to grow fresh produce for the food bank. where it is distributed to other community members in need of food. Together, we also offer community cooking programs that bring together members of the community around healthy meals.
- In 2005, our Investing in our Diversity scholarship program grew to include three more communities across the city through a new partnership with the Toronto Community Housing Corporation. This allowed us to provide 9 youth with scholarships valued at \$33,000 in recognition of their engagement on anti-racism and diversity issues.
- Through the Community Education and Access to Police Complaints Project, we have formed a network of 38 partners which includes the Toronto Police service. Along with providing education and access and support in navigating the police complaints system, this project has built stronger relationships between communities and police. This is an important step toward addressing a range of other social problems that cut across communities in the city.
- Our mandate and our work go beyond the few square blocks of our catchment area. Scadding Court programs therefore have the potential to affect everyone...locally, nationally and internationally. To connect communities at the global level, we have developed an international program that allows us collaborate on projects of shared interest with mutual benefits for all parties involved. In 2005, we developed a partnership with the Durbar Mahila Samanwaya Committee in West Bengal India with whom we are developing a youth program.

I would like to extend my thanks to our talented staff, dedicated board members and volunteers, committed partner organizations and funders and supporters. Together we create the conditions that promote community engagement, allow partnerships to develop and flourish and make this neighbourhood, city, country and world a better place in which to live.

## **Program Highlights**

## Youth Employment through Community Composting

By building five community composting sites, teaching school and community groups about the importance of composting and working with community gardens throughout the community, 20 young people developed many diverse general and job-specific skills through this full time program. At the same time they contributed to a cleaner and greener local environment. improved local food security through community gardening and demonstrated the positive role that youth can play within a community. This successful program benefited both the participants and the community at large - a model which serves as an inspiration to us for future initiatives.

#### School Readiness Program

When 3 year old Emily, who is looked after by her grandmother in an isolated environment, first came to our program she was not comfortable playing with other children. She had a difficult time when separated from her mother or grandmother and had to hold her mother's hands at all times. When we approached her through play, we realized that she was shy and needed more time to get close with staff and children. Day by day we held her hand during circle time and playing on the floor. After 10 weeks and with many teary moments, she began to stay calm when her mother left her. Eventually Emily began to look forward to the program and developed a range of skills designed to help her and her family enter the Canadian school system.

In 2005, 107 children aged 3 - 6 and their families participated in this preschool educational training program, increasing the chances that their experience with the school system will be successful and developing positive relationships with the local schools - Ryerson, Orde Street, Kensington and Charles Fraser Public Schools.

#### Community Education & Access to Police Complaints (CEAPC) Demonstration Project



People want to know how the police complaints system works, many want or are in need of help to access that system, not everyone speaks English as a first language and a lot of people do not know their rights and where to go to learn about them.

Through 38 partners, intensive outreach and education, bringing together s police and communities, training frontline staff across the city and by providing individualized support in documenting and filing complaints, this project makes the police complaints process more understandable. accessible and available to members of diverse communities across the city. In doing so, the CEAPC project is raising the bar with respect to how police complaints are handled, both in Toronto and in other jurisdictions.
