## MARKET 707 AND BUSINESS IN A BOX

During 2012, Market 707 began its transition from a project at Scadding Court to a model for community economic development and animation that could be replicated and scaled up. This model is unlike anything found elsewhere in Toronto or truly the world. It transforms underutilized spaces into business opportunities for micro-enterprises, and spaces for community animation – all with the use of repurposed shipping containers. So far, Market 707 hosts 12 spaces for micro-enterprise allowing businesses to grow and flourish for rent as little as \$10/day. This model has enormous potential across the city, but in order to make that happen, partners and cross-sector input is essential.

### Design Charrette

In June, Scadding Court partnered with The Working Habitat to host a design Charrette that invited brilliant minds from diverse sectors including architects, the City of Toronto’s Parks, Forestry and Recreation Department, Business Improvement Areas, urban planners, community members, business minds and so many more to think through the possibilities of how and what containers could do for underutilized spaces across the city of Toronto. The over 35 participants explored options for suburban strip malls, apartment towers, parks and temporary markets. Simultaneously, Scadding Court launched the first draft of its Modular Market Developers Manual, a catalogue of what we’ve learned so far. ### Business in a Box Model

From this thought-provoking launch point, Scadding Court built on the need for partnerships by successfully applying for funding from the Ontario Centres of Excellence to work with Ryerson University and Levitt



Goodman Architects. With these partners, Scadding Court officially created “Business in a Box”, which is the replicable concept behind Market 707. Over the course of a year, Scadding Court worked with Ryerson and Levitt Goodman to create a business strategy and the tools necessary to facilitate replicating this project in other areas of Toronto and beyond. The first step was testing out a new retail model through two new containers that have added to Market 707 in 2013. Evolving this model is a process that benefits from bringing together expertise and crossing traditional boundaries; we were and continue to be overwhelmed by the numbers and breadth of experts so readily willing to lend their minds and talents to this unique project.

## COMMUNITY - POLICE RELATIONS

In 2012, building on programs and projects developed over the past decade, Scadding Court continued important work to advance positive community- police relations. We are proud to continue to work with the Toronto Police Service to strengthen community relations while advocating for systems- change that directly impacts residents across the province.

### Youth-police Programming

Positive youth-police relations are critical to a safe and healthy community and in 2012 youth and police worked together on a variety of activities in order to strengthen those critical ties. Police officers and youth from Scadding Court jointly delivered hate crime prevention workshops to high schools students, played volleyball and basketball together, snow-tubed and spent meaningful time getting to know one another. From going to see movies to playing field hockey, over the course of the year over 15 local officers participated in different activities with young people in the neighbourhood.

### Police Complaints Forum

The "Ontario Police Complaints System Forum: Perspectives On Where We Are Three Years Later" was hosted by Scadding Court in Toronto on November 26 and 27, 2012. Co-chaired by the University of Waterloo, 150 delegates from 60 organizations and 9 police services from across Ontario discussed the current state of the police complaints system. A number of recommendations emerged out of the Forum that focused on how to improve the police complaints system and the Office of the Independent Police Review Director (OIPRD).

In 2007, the Ontario legislature passed The Independent Police Review Act (the "Act") to create the OIPRD with the goal of providing "an objective, impartial office to receive, manage and oversee the investigation of public complaints against Ontario's police". Up until that point, no public review of the new police complaints system had been done. As a result, the Forum brought together the three key stakeholders: community, police and government, to provide feedback and collaboratively create suggestions on how the OIPRD can continue to evolve and improve.



An official launch event will take place in 2013 to showcase the recommendations and begin advocacy efforts directed at the institutions and levels of government with the authority to address issues raised at the Forum.

## INVESTING IN OUR DIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Investing in Our Diversity Scholarship program for the 10th consecutive year continues to break down financial barriers for young leaders across the City of Toronto to access higher education. In 2012, the program awarded \$105,000 to 46 deserving young leaders based on their community building work and volunteerism. Recipients demonstrated leadership both in their school and community, organizing and leading a host of initiatives including female empowerment programs, educational drug prevention workshops, charity events and community gatherings. With a focus on providing opportunities to low-income young people from diverse backgrounds, communities such as Alexandra Park, Lawrence Heights, Regent Park and Rexdale saw a significant number of scholarship winners.

The employment component of the program reached record breaking numbers with 12 recipients receiving an internship or summer employment opportunity. New internship opportunities were offered at City Hall and Queen's Park for recipients interested in pursuing careers in the public sector.

14 Division's Community Police Liaison Committee (CPLC), a recent partner of the program participated for a second year. The Committee successfully reached their fundraising goal of \$5,000, and awarded two youth with scholarships of \$2,500 each.

The Annual Awards and Fundraising Dinner hosted over 350 people. Those in attendance included elected officials, sponsors, donors, community members and program supporters. To date, the scholarship program has awarded 203 scholarships totalling over \$500,000 and secured matching scholarships valued at over \$270,000 from our academic partners which have included Ryerson University, University of Toronto, York University, OCAD University, George Brown College, Seneca College and Humber College.

## FOOD ACCESS AND URBAN AGRICULTURE

Scadding Court's history of addressing food access issues head on has continued to grow in 2012. In addition to maintaining 150 garden plots, producing 1500lbs of fresh produce in our Diversity Garden for local food access initiatives, and coordinating multiple community kitchen programs, a number of food access projects were planted, nurtured and flourished at the Centre in 2012.

### Noninna's Table

This group started at Scadding Court in 2012 to provide a nutritious, monthly lunch, free of charge. In response to the need for an inclusive meal program for families and students, a team of dedicated volunteers from St. Francis of Assisi Church worked with Scadding Court to transform their passion for cooking into this amazing program. A social event as much as a food justice program, Noninna's Table is bursting at the seams, expanding from 150 participants to now over 250 every month.

Given the changing environment in the neighbourhood with the revitalizations of Atkinson Co-operative Housing, Ryerson Community School and Scadding Court Community Centre, this group of active residents recognizes that Alexandra Park needs the support of the community and the community needs Alexandra Park. Scadding Court agrees and has worked with this newly forming association which has already achieved a lot. The aim of the group is to beautify and improve Alexandra Park, the local environment through an inclusion, community-driven process that encourages interaction among park users and residents.

### Community Events

Book-ending the growing season, in 2012 Scadding Court again hosted both Seedy Saturday in March and the 2nd annual Harvest Festival in September. Seedy Saturday, Toronto's foremost grassroots seed exchange, gardening and eco-fair, saw three thousand people participate in a seed exchange, purchase goods from vendors, enjoy great local food, and take part in workshops and demonstrations. Community members were able to take home their seeds and new skills, and then reunite for the Harvest Festival when they celebrated the fruits of their labour. This community event brought together food lovers, educators, activists, culinary experts and other partners passionate about food. The day was celebrated with fantastic performers, food demonstrations, giveaways, a children's area, a pie contest, seedling and sprouting activities, and more.

### Kitchen Away from Home program

While homelessness continues to plague our city, we continue to find new ways to make the Centre a place where people can participate in activities that their life circumstances now prevent. In this case, many under-housed women are prevented from cooking, which results from the fact that most shelters and temporary housing facilities do not allow clients access to a kitchen. As explained in the Toronto Star article, "After a homeless woman arrived with a crock pot and started cooking in the lobby, Scadding Court started a regular women's cooking program".

To ensure under-housed women across our City are able to cook, eat nutritious and tasty food, and most importantly have personal control over what food they eat, the Kitchen Away from Home program runs weekly by invitation only. Participants bring their indomitable spirits, treasured recipes, cook and share delicious food and stories from all parts of the world. It has been a great success and supports a network of talented women who teach staff at the Centre new things all the time.

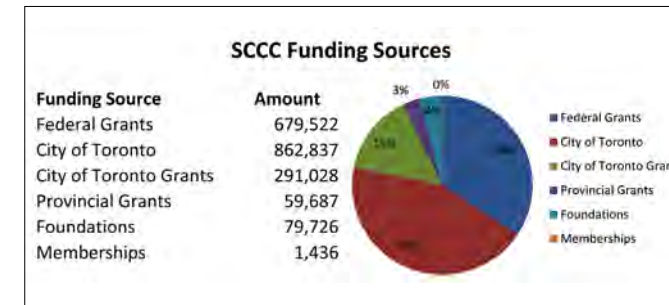
